Who May be Nominated? <u>An individual</u> (male or female, living or deceased) <u>or an organization</u>. ***<u>The recipient may not be a current or former member of The Ninety-Nines or of a group</u> within The Ninety-Nines.

GEORGE PALMER PUTNAM AWARD (for non-Ninety-Nines)

- Recognizes support provided to The Ninety-Nines by an individual (male or female, living or deceased) or an
- organization. The contribution may have occurred in the past or present, as a single action or a series of events.

Who May be Nominated? An individual (male or female, living or deceased), or an organization. The recipient may not be a current or former member of The Ninety-Nines or of a group within The Ninety-Nines.

Who may submit nominations?

A Ninety-Nines Chapter, Section, or Trust.

How to nominate: Submit a one-page letter, signed by two officers or trustees (as appropriate). The nomination must include the name, address, and telephone number of the nominee, or the nominee's next-of-kin if the nominee is deceased. Up to three additional pages of substantiating material may be attached to the letter.

LAST CALL - North Central Section Spinning Prop Award 2024

The North Central Section **Spinning Prop Award** recognizes the NCS member who logs the most uncompensated general aviation hours in a one-year period. Flight hours in all aircraft are included: airplane, helicopter, light sport, glider, balloon and more. Take to the skies and log those hours!

Purpose: The NCS Spinning Prop Award was created to encourage and promote more flying by 99 members.

Pilot Eligibility: This award is open to all NCS Ninety-Nines and Student Pilot members. All applicants must be International members. If a member joined during the period of eligibility, only those hours accrued during that portion of the year that she was an official 99 or Student Pilot are eligible.

Hours of Eligibility: General Aviation hours for which the pilot did not receive any compensation are eligible. Safety pilot time is applicable. Student pilot time is eligible when logging PIC hours. Simulator time is not eligible. (Note to CFIs: time can count toward the award if you provided free dual and therefore no compensation was received.)

Dates of Eligibility: March 1, 2023 through February 28, 2024.

How to Apply: Applicants should submit the following information to the Chapter Chair: name, date the applicant joined The 99s, total hours flown in the eligibility period and specific number of uncompensated hours flown in that time. (Note: The total number of uncompensated hours must match those shown in the logbook.) Once the 99 who has the most uncompensated hours is identified by the Chapter Chair, the Chair should submit a recent picture and hard copies of the logbook for the applicable period. Both sides of the logbook must be copied and numbered clearly. Please number the left side page as XXA and right side as XXB (1A,1B, 2A, 2B, etc.) Hours which are not applicable, as well as those which apply, must be clearly identified. Allow for sufficient time for Chapter Chair review before the final submission deadline (see below).

Chapter Chairs: Please review and provide copies of the relevant logbook pages of your member with the highest number of uncompensated hours during the Dates of Eligibility, along with a recent picture of this 99. All requested information for the Chapter's nominee should be provided to NCS Directors Margaret Wint and Jeneanne Visser via email at directors@ncs99s.org or via hard copy mailing to: Margaret Wint, 2730 Hickorywood Ln SE, Grand Rapids, MI 49546-7433.



THE NINETY-NINES, INC. NORTH CENTRAL SECTION FALL BUSINESS MEETING – September 30, 2023 Dublin, Ohio

The meeting was called to order by Governor Deb McGee at 0902 a.m. EDT.

Attending were NCS Board Members: Governor Deb McGee (Iowa), Vice-Governor Sue Glisson (Kentucky Bluegrass), Secretary Kathy Lester-Ross (Wisconsin), Director Margaret Wint (Indiana Dunes), Director Jeneanne Visser (Iowa), Past Governor Janice Welsh (Indiana Dunes). Treasurer Joan Plato (Wisconsin) attended via Zoom. International 99s guest included Vice President Minnetta Gardinier (Iowa). Members Welsh and Wint were acknowledged for their respective International 99s committee roles on the Awards and Nominating committees.

Governor McGee thanked the Scioto Valley Chapter for hosting the meeting and introduced NCS BOD.
Attendees represented several membership milestones: 7 past NCS Governors: [Janice Welsh (IN Dunes), Ellen O'Hara (Chicago Area), Minnetta Gardiner (Iowa), Shelley Ventura (Chicago Area), Betty Huck (All Ohio), Donna Moore(NCS At Large, formerly Women with Wings) and Elaine Morrow (Minnesota; past International President) via Zoom. Seven past AE scholarship winners were present, along with 5 first time attendees. Years of 99s membership were acknowledged and ranged from 3 women being members for less than 1 year and 2 who have been members for more than 50 years – Kaye Combs Moore [Kentucky] and Ellen O'Hara [Chicago Area]. Three attendees have been members from 1-10 years, 13 have been 99s for 11-25 years, 7 were in the 26-40 year membership range and 7 have been active for 41-50 years. Six 99s arrived in their own aircraft.

Secretary Lester-Ross reported 40 NCS members signed the attendance sheets; additionally, 12 were present via Zoom. A quorum was achieved as 11 of the 14 NCS Chapters and members from the At Large group were represented. [Chapters not present: Greater Kansas City, Greater St. Louis & Indiana.] BOARD REPORTS

Governor McGee's report included reminders to be sure 99s contact information is accurate & that publications are available electronically, saving printing and mailing costs. It was noted that it is costly when printed literature is not deliverable; items are not returned to The 99s for incorrect mailing reasons. Opting to vote electronically also saves a considerable amount of resources as it is 7 times more costly to process hard copy ballots. Members are encouraged to volunteer ideas and join various committees in the Chapter, Section and International areas. Contact Gov. McGee for more information. Vigilance and caution are strongly recommended with emails: several BOD and other members have again received phishing emails. Checking the email address extensions may identify fraudulent senders and deleting without opening is critical. Only use generic vs personal email addresses with 99s correspondence. Each Chapter is responsible for the timely and accurate processing and filing it's own state documents, as well as those required by NCS or International, such as 501c3 forms.

Vice Gov. Glisson extended a heartfelt thank you to the Scioto Valley Chapter for hosting this Fall Section meeting. She is available to assist with changes to ByLaws and Standing Rules & reminded all that these need to be current and reflect the actions and activities of Chapters as they fulfill the mission and values of The 99s organization.

Secretary Lester-Ross indicated the minutes of the Spring 2023 NCS meeting appeared in Waypoint and hard copies were available to review on site. Madeleine Monaco (Chicago Area) moved to approve the minutes as presented, with Shelley Ventura (Chicago Area) offering the second. All approved.

Treasurer Plato presented the financial report, including the checking and savings balances, rebate revenue from memberships and expenditures to date. The report was accepted and will be filed. Treasurer Plato indicated that all Chapter 501c3 filings were received, filed and confirmed. Members are encouraged to think of fundraising ideas to supplant the NCS treasury. A discussion ensued regarding how to achieve better return on our accounts, with suggestions from attendees including short term investments like CDs and various bank & online offerings. It was noted there are some complexities related to our 501c3 status, where we bank and whether various institutions offer products available to persons versus those available to organizations such as The 99s. Attendees agreed that Treasurer Plato, Gov. McGee and the NCS BOD should investigate further and provide clarification at the Spring 2024 meeting. Director Visser recapped activities with Chapter Chairs and information about the 3 NCS annual awards. March 18, 2024 will be the deadline for the 2024 nominations. Accuracy in log book entries and submission of all the required elements is imperative for each Spinning Prop award. For the 49 ½ and Governors Service awards, providing objective and quantifiable activities, as well as the need-to-know comments, greatly help in comparing submissions. Ideas were welcomed for more interesting and dynamic ways to present the 2 minute verbal Chapter Chair reports due at the Spring NCS meeting.

Director Wint reminded all members that the Directors are the liaison for all Chapters in line for hosting a Section meeting. They can provide resources & guidance over the timelines needed for planning these sessions. Ask the Directors for help and clarification in preparing nominations and planning meetings.

Prior to presenting the official greetings from the International BOD and 99s Headquarters, Minnetta Gardinier, International 99s Vice President (Iowa) noted that there are currently two 99 members who have been continuous 99s since April, 1946 and May, 1948 – noting that our 2 NCS fifty year members now have a membership longevity goal.

AMELIA EARHART SCHOLARSHIP CHAIR LAURIE PROBST

Fall of 2022 and 2023 reminder emails were sent to Chapter and AE Scholarship Chairs regarding First Wings prerequisites, as well as due dates, location of materials, and tips for writing a quality application package. Questions sent by email, phone, and text were addressed to help applicants and their mentors/chairs navigate the application process. In Spring of 2023, First Wings reminders went out again, in advance of the second application window.

Fall 2022 First Wings winners from the NCS included: Ana Adona (Chicago), Esther Kotyk (All-Ohio), Brittany Moon (Indiana), Allison Ranzau (Kentucky Bluegrass), Crystal Simon (Wisconsin)

As AE Scholarship applications became available in October of last year, a detailed email to Chapter and AE Scholarship Chairs went out regarding the requirements, as well as location of materials, links to resources to help create a quality application, and other pertinent information. Our section received four applications. The committee, comprised of Laurie Probst, Morgan Duling, Leire Kennedy, and Ellen Herring, went through the applications, gave suggestions for improvement, and approved the final drafts to be sent on to the Trustees. Three of the applicants won AE Scholarships: Mandi Neumann (Wisconsin) for her Commercial, Macy Arbuckle (Iowa) for her Instrument, and Olivia Parmenter (Kentucky Bluegrass) for her academic program.

FLYING ACTIVITIES

Below is a list of the Flying Activities that some of our Chapters have been doing for the past year. It's quite impressive! All-Ohio – Most of their meetings are "fly-outs". They flew to: VTA, FDY, I74, 17G, 8G1, and MFD. Member Deb Henrichs flew in Alaska with a former All-Ohio 99, Leota Lane. Leota was the PIC because most of the flying is using pilotage and they usually fly under 500 feet! They flew to Homer, Talneetka and the Knik Glacier. Another member, Peg Ballou, flew to OSH via Marathon, KS and she flew to VT.

Chicago Area – They also flew to many of their meetings with some fun added twists – KUGN for pierogis (lunch) and a maintenance safety program; Pilot Pete's (06C) for dinner; Porter, IN and Louisville, KY for the Fall and Spring NCS Section Meeting; Holland, MI to join with the MI Chapter at Tulip Fest. They now have a Navy jet pilot and an Air Wisconsin First Officer and 3 student pilots (and we all know they are flying a LOT!) Kansas City Chapter – Four members flew to an airport near Whiteman Air Force Base to participate in a great tour of the base, which included time in a B2 full motion simulator! One of their members is a B2 pilot. They also got a tour of the tower and an up-close look at the B2.

Lake Erie Chapter – These ladies are intent on learning! Three members earned: PPL, Multi and Commercial, and Instrument, and ATP. HISTORY AND PRESERVATION

I was thinking about some of our past 99s and trying to remember their activities, their era of participating in our chapter which was maybe before my joining, and sometimes, their names. How could I forget that? Where do I look? I called 99s who knew them. They forgot stuff, too. And now we want to know again. We used to make scrapbooks. Where are they? A basement. A hangar. Somewhere around here. We need a PLACE TO LOOK!

Now that one is easy--99s headquarters in the museum archives. But they can't help us if we haven't sent them anything. We'll do that. I go to my sister 99's attached hangar to the house one hot afternoon and bring a 1956 scrapbook from one of the boxes into her dining room...I start the Adobe app on my phone with her help and start taking pix of the pages. Everything cover to cover. I remove the plastic overlay on each page, sometimes relocating the newspaper articles because the glue dried out. Easy to generally point at the page and click. Don't worry about what's under and around that page. Adobe puts lines around the page and you move them to adjust if necessary and click to the next screen. Perfect. And quick. She's working in the kitchen and sometimes I tell her about a really neat writeup or a "Did you ever know So and So?" But all of a sudden I smell supper cooking!.Where did the time go? It was really a lot of fun! Ok. Time to forward to headquarters. Title it and save to PDF. Use chapter name, year of info, and important words like Powder Puff Derby 1956. If there are more than 25 pages to copy, use the same title and A. B. C, etc. Send. Done. You can also collect a year or era on a thumb drive and headquarters can change it into their system.

The scrapbooks and memorabilia themselves can be given to the local museum, if you have to, after assuring the info was copied and received. Many are in your town, county, etc. But the photo records can be given easily to anybody in the world. Any really important or unique original photos should go to headquarters. They cannot store all the physical articles that we have kept but you have to decide if something in our museum is what historians or relatives seeking family history would want or like to hear about.

By the way, our own family historians would love us to do that for our own families! Recently a friend mentioned recording your own personal experiences and family stories so people can actually hear you telling them. Those can actually be updated as electronics advance, but it's an interesting aspect to try.

And, of course, life gets in the way of our desires. It happens all the time, and I myself try to forward as much info as I know about my own families as I can to our younger generations. What a pleasure it was, recently, to talk to a college student relative who wants to receive and pass on this information. Lately it seems that I'd better move a little faster! My grandparents on Mom's side were born in 1859 and 1860. My Mom was the youngest, born in 1901. Those same grandparents died in 1945 and 1947 and I'm the only living cousin who actually met them when I was young. So I have to write my stories of them while I still remember them! And I will! But first, I have to...no, no. I WILL do more of all of the above for at least an hour each (99s and family records) during this next week. Yes I will! I make this commitment to you! Ellen ps Will YOU do the same? I have told my daughter about this plan, so now I am really committed!

Insurance Requirements for Ninety-Nines events can be found on the website under the Library tab, Forms, Lists, and Guides. The insurance forms include a Flying Event Liability Waiver, Chapter Non-Flying Event (where an additional insured is required) and Chapter Flying Event. For Chapter Flying Events helicopters, homebuilts and experimentals are now covered. There are still some categories of aircraft that are excluded. The excluded aircraft are listed on the form. Chapter Flying Events may require a \$125 fee from the chapter. In some cases, this fee is waived. Contact Laura Ohrenberg at Headquarters if there are questions.

INT FOREST OF FRIENDSHIP

The International Forest of Friendship Induction Ceremony occurred on September 15-16, 2023, in Atchison, KS. The North Central Section honored Christine Murdock (Indiana Dunes Chapter) posthumously. Christine passed away at the age of 89 in April, 2023. This year's theme was Discovery Through Flight. SAFETY/FAASTEAM

This year, many 99s not only attended webinars and seminars, but several facilitated WINGS events. The Chicago Chapter again held its Expo IFR/VFR Safety Seminar and Flying Companion Course in January, which is an all-day event at no cost to participants. The Wisconsin Chapter has a few members who are safety representatives, and they helped facilitate seminars (Laurie Probst, Bridgett Cornett, Karen Kalishek). There were also 99s who are not safety representatives who gave presentations (Sara Siddiqui). The FAASTeam has encouraged pilots who wish to help with the program to ask their local representatives as to how they can get involved. You don't have to be an instructor to be a safety representative. The FAASTeam puts out a topic of the month presentation, as well as a library of presentations on various topics to help representatives with materials. If you have members who are interested in becoming safety representatives, please ask and I will be happy to help connect them to their local FPM.

As a FAASTeam Representative, my other role (besides giving seminars) is that of promoting webinars and seminars on social media. Currently, I post in various groups so that pilots have more of a reminder about upcoming safety events. While those in the WINGS Program receive emails regarding upcoming events, many have remarked that the social media posts not only serve as more of a reminder (instead of getting lost in a bunch of emails in an inbox), but also promote discussion within the posts. Posts are created for the NCS and 99s International pages on Facebook.

A survey link went out to Waypoint for each chapter in the NCS in regard to the FAASTeam/WINGS Program. The hope is that each chapter does the survey so that we can get a better idea of how many of our NCS 99s are representatives, what needs chapters have in regard to safety programming, and what is being offered that other chapters could attend and/or replicate. Once information is gathered, it will be compiled and reported out to the Section, and any needed connections will be facilitated.

Richard J. Santori Memorial Scholarship



The Richard J. Santori Memorial Scholarship offers two annual scholarships to members of the North Central Section ("NCS") under the auspices of The Chicago Area Chapter of The Ninety-Nines ("CAC").

One scholarship in the amount of \$2,000 is to be used to assist a 99 in the completion of an additional pilot certificate or rating. Applicants must be a current pilot with the appropriate medical certificate and must be approaching the flight time requirement for the desired rating or certificate.

The other scholarship offers \$1,000 to assist a Student Pilot Member toward completion of an initial pilot certificate in any aircraft. Applicants must have soloed, and, if required for the pilot certificate sought, must have a current medical certificate and must have passed the written exam.

Applicants must be a current member of The 99s, the NCS and their chapter in good standing.

Applicants must submit three (3) copies of each: the completed and signed application including the form; attached essay; letter of recommendation from their chapter chair; proof of certificates and ratings held; medical certificate; proof of date and score of knowledge tests taken; copy of last page(s) of logbook showing current hours flown; and a letter of reference from someone outside of the aviation community who is not a relative. These documents must be mailed to the address on the application form to be postmarked no later than the date indicated on the form.

Funds will be paid from receipts which document the training. Receipts must be signed by both the student and instructor and include copies of the logbook if applicable.

Funds are to be used within two years of the award date. Prior applicants and recipients may re-apply in future years.

The winning candidate and all candidates who did not qualify will be notified within one month after the receipt deadline.
